fairly common in Hawaii, that is also becoming popular in New York. They would like to better

understand where the Hawaiian lineages come from as historical records seem to indicate they

got here in the early 19th century. They are also interested in what poha diversity is found within

Hawaii's collection of plants.

Thank you to all who responded to my grant project farm collaborator request. The proposal was

submitted, and we will now need to wait for a response from the grant agency on whether or not

the project will be funded.

Although we could only accept a limited number of collaborators, several requests came in for

interest in this sterile, hybrid Leucaena, 'KX4-Hawaii'. So, I am creating a list of farmers interested

in planting this nitrogen-fixing plant for shade, windbreak and/or mulch purposes. This list is not a

part of the grant, but UH faculty/staff may be able to propagate materials for interested growers.

There will likely be a fee per plant, but at this point in time, I don't know this cost.

Many food entrepreneurs in Hawai'i offer a variety of products but are unaware of the many regulations required in food labeling. The Food Safety and Modernization Act (FSMA) requires most manufacturers to comply with new nutrition labeling and food safety plans and there are also existing food regulations which businesses need to be aware of. The State Department of Health is requiring all food manufacturers to have at a minimum, a Hazard Analysis Critical Control Point (HACCP) Plan. This class will provide practical tips and information on:

Hawaii County FSA Updates

Flash flooding has caused severe damage in the Pahala and Windward areas of the County. Farms and ranches suffering severe damage may be eligible for assistance under the Emergency Conservation Program (ECP) administered by the Hawaii County Farm Service Agency (FSA) For land to be eligible, the natural disaster must create new conservation problems that, if untreated, would:

- be so costly to rehabilitate that Federal assistance is or will be needed to return the land to productive agricultural use
- is unusual and is not the type that would recur frequently in the same area
- affect the productive capacity of the farmland
- impair or endanger the land

A producer qualifying for ECP assistance may receive cost-share levels not to exceed 75 percent of the eligible cost of restoration measures. Eligible socially disadvantaged and beginning farmers and ranchers can receive up to 90 percent of the eligible cost of restoration. No producer is eligible for more than \$500,000 cost sharing per natural disaster occurrence. The following types of measures may be eligible:

- removing debris from farmland
- · grading, shaping, or releveling severely damaged farmland
- restoring permanent fences
- restoring conservation structures and other similar installations

Producers who have suffered a loss from a natural disaster may contact the local FSA County Office and request assistance today through March 13, 2020.

To be eligible for assistance, practices must not be started until all of the following are met:

- an application for cost-share assistance has been filed
- the local FSA County Committee (COC) or its representative has conducted an onsite inspection of the damaged area
- the Agency responsible for technical assistance, such as the Natural Resource Conservation Service (NRCS), has made a needs determination, which may include cubic yards of earthmoving, etc., required for rehabilitation

Cornell: Spending time in nature reduces stress, research finds

New research from an interdisciplinary Cornell team has found that as little as 10 minutes in a natural setting can help college students feel happier and lessen the effects of both physical and mental stress.

The research, published Jan. 14 in Frontiers in Psychology, is part of a larger examination of "nature therapy" and aims to provide an easily-achievable dosage that physicians can prescribe as a preventive measure against high levels of stress, anxiety, depression and other mental health issues college students face.

Although the study only examined the effects on college aged people, these results may not be limited to those between 15 & 30 years old.

<u>USDA Offers New Hurricane Insurance Endorsement for Crop Year 2020</u>

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Risk Management Agency announced today a new crop insurance endorsement, Hurricane Insurance Protection — Wind Index (HIP-WI). HIP-WI covers a portion of the deductible of the underlying crop insurance policy when a county, or county adjacent, is within the area of sustained hurricane-force winds. HIP-WI provides coverage for 70 different crops and is available in counties in the vicinity of the Gulf of Mexico and the Atlantic, as well as Hawaii. The past few hurricane seasons have shown that more coverage is needed in these areas and that prompt payment for losses is important not only for the impacted producers, but also for their rural communities.
