Dear Growers and Friends,

With the importance of coffee leaf rust (CLR), please don't forget about coffee berry borer (CBB) management.

CBB:

Field sanitation and strip-picking (https://bit.ly/3opjqy3) are related proactive approaches that all coffee farmers in Hawaii should apply during the fruit production period and at the end of the harvest season. They are the MOST IMPORTANT CBB-control activities.

Strip-pick all remaining coffee (green, ripe, over-ripe, and raisined berries) at the end of harvest, before pruning, and again at the beginning of the next season to remove CBB breeding sites. A video about strip-picking can be viewed at https://bit.ly/2VAV47S.

Coffee Pruning:

Pruning recommendations are based on the best information we have available now, and things may change in the future as research is conducted. The main purposes of pruning are to generate new vegetative growth, increase light and airflow through the tree canopy, manipulate shade, and (generally) increase yield, by removing non-productive old verticals and laterals. According to Avelino et al. (2004), there are positive, negative, and variable effects of pruning with regard to CLR management (https://bit.ly/3g8jbEz). They go on to say that the immediate effect of pruning, is a reduction of the foliage area that may intercept spores, and the elimination of infectious lesions. Thus, pruning simultaneously reduces the amount of inoculum (CLR spores) available for dispersal and the probability of spore interception until new regrowth occurs.

Some level of CLR and CBB will continue to be present from one season to the next on infected/infested farms. As such, a goal for growers with CLR, is to keep the level under 5% incidence and with the lowest CBB infestation feasible, then maintain these low levels with recommended management practices.

PRIOR to pruning:

- 1. Strip-pick all coffee from the branches to kill CBB, and
- 2. Spray after strip-picking with approved fungicides to kill CLR spores and reduce their spread.

You may consider stump pruning in large blocks for CLR and CBB control. If maintaining a Kona-style pruning system, you may consider selective removal of laterals and verticals to assist with spray coverage and ease of spraying. Then, follow up with monitoring and spraying (as needed) for CLR and CBB. Find CLR spraying information here (https://bit.ly/39G1|HW) and CBB spraying information here (https://bit.ly/39S4YL1).

At CLR incidence levels greater than 5%, spraying, pruning, and leaf removal may be necessary to reduce CLR spore populations and severity levels (Pelli et al. 2014) (https://bit.ly/3qp9lTq). Do not move CLR-infected tree material off-farm, follow sanitation protocols (https://bit.ly/3omfkXu), and spray before

pruning to reduce CLR spread. Below are potential methods of disposal of plant materials colonized and infected by CLR:

- Burning
 - Apply for and abide by the regulations of your approved agricultural burning permit from the Department of Health's Clean Air Branch (https://bit.ly/36HdURr).
- Composting
 - o Pile or chip and pile infected leaves and branches and cover the pile.
 - Secure the cover (over pile) to prevent live spores from being transferred back into the field.
 - Since branches may poke holes in the covering use a thick, non-porous material without holes or openings as a covering.
 - Keep the pile covered for at least 6 weeks.
- Solar heating
 - Collect infected leaves and enclose them in a non-porous bag.
 - If adding branches, use a thick, non-porous material to prevent branches from poking holes in the bag.
 - Leave the bag in direct sun for at least 6 weeks.

Once devoid of live CLR spores, plant materials can be returned to the farm as mulch or compost.
