Dear Growers and Friends,

CLR Race Identified:

Hawaii's coffee leaf rust (CLR) has been identified by researchers in Portugal as rust **race XXIV (24)**. Data appears to show that this was a single introduction to the state. Ten samples (Kona 1, Kona 3, Kona 4, Maui 5, Maui 6, Maui 7, Maui 8, Maui 9 and Molokai 10) were characterized as race XXIV with the virulence genes v2,4,5.

This race can attack the following coffee selections or cultivars:

- Typica (SH5)
- Bourbon (SH5)
- Kents (SH2, SH5)
- Agaro (SH4, SH5)
- Cioiccie (SH4, SH5)
- Blue Mountain (SH2, SH5)
- Bourbon N.39, SL 14, SL 28 with the resistance gene SH5
- Catuaí (SH5)
- Caturra (SH5)
- K7 (SH2, SH5)
- Mundo Novo (SH5)
- Pacas (SH5)
- Padang (SH5)
- Villa Sarchi (SH5)

In the future, it is possible Hawaii's CLR race will gain virulence genes because of selection pressure in coffee farms. Race XXIV is very common in many coffee regions and researchers think that this rust was introduced to Hawaii as race XXIV (v2,4,5) and not as race II (v5) or race XV (v4,5) or race I (v2,5) with further evolution in virulence to v2,4,5.

According to an article abstract (https://bit.ly/3mjekEE - translated from Portugese) and summarized further for race XXIV:

...The "in vitro" [research] results showed the following behaviors of race XXIV:

- High spore germination, 1b) medium length of the germinative tube;
- Incubation period of less than 20 days on susceptible plants;
- Large areas of leaves pustuled (lesioned);
- High number of spores per square milimeter in the pustules (lesions); and
- High aggressiveness

Current and future plantings of resistant or tolerant coffee tree varieties should still be sprayed with approved fungicides to avoid creating more virulent strains of CLR. Here is a recently published paper that Dr. Lisa Keith (USDA-PBARC) found to illustrate this point - https://bit.ly/3Fro6Ms

Because of the 20-day incubation period of CLR race XXIV, spray applications with contact fungicides

should be conducted at least every 20 days or more frequently, to kill newly produced spores on lesions.

Apply for a Targeted EIDL Advance

The Small Business Administration (SBA) will accept applications for Targeted Economic Injury Disaster Loan (EIDL) Advances until **Dec. 31, 2021**:

- Eligible companies can receive up to \$10,000 that doesn't need to be repaid.
- Businesses must be in low-income communities, have no more than 300 employees, and have been significantly affected by the pandemic.
- A company must first apply for the SBA's COVID-19 EIDL. The business does not need to accept the loan or be approved for the loan to receive an advance.

A business can also apply for a \$5,000 Supplemental EIDL Advance by **Dec. 31, 2021** when:

- A company is in a low-income community and can demonstrate more than a 50% reduction in revenue since March 2020.
- The business has 10 or fewer employees.
- The supplemental advance doesn't need to be repaid.

<u>Videos Announcements from the USDA National Agricultural Statistics Service</u>

Mailing this December - National Agricultural Classification Survey (NACS)

Some have already seen this but for those that haven't, please visit https://bit.ly/3smyxxt to view the News Release for the National Agricultural Classification Survey (NACS) that went out last week. The report was sent to ~2,900 potential Hawaii farmers/ranchers. Forms that meet the farm threshold (see definitions below) will be included in the 2022 Census of Agriculture.

- Farm definition: "USDA defines a farm as any place from which \$1,000 or more of agricultural products are produced and sold, or are normally sold, during the year."

Farm Producer Study

Mailing out to 75,000 producers nationwide on Dec. 20, the *Farm Producer Study* is a one-time test survey. The purpose of this expanded demographic study is to improve our understanding of the agricultural population and help the USDA better serve agricultural producers. Every response is vital. The deadline for response is Jan. 18, 2022. Depending on test results, the questions might be included in the 2027 Census of Agriculture. The survey will take no longer than 10 minutes. It can be completed online or by mail. As always, all information provided is confidential, protected by federal law. The results of the study will be posted on the NASS website as a research report in the Education and Outreach section in 2022. No official estimates will be published from this study.

Ag Census Content and New Respondent Portal Test

NASS is conducting another ag census content test in preparation for the 2022 Census of Agriculture. Mailing survey codes in two weeks to 15,000 producers nationwide, this survey is online only. It will test the expanded use of previously reported data (checking for continued accuracy; the hope is that using previously reported data will lessen respondent burden) AND NASS's new respondent portal for the very first time. The portal, developed over several months, will be a one-stop-shop for producers to respond to surveys, access reports of interest, reference previously completed surveys, get NASS news, and more. The deadline for response is Feb. 7, 2022.

Hawaii Receives \$4.9 million in USDA Funding for Supply Chain Assistance for Schools

Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack announced that the Biden-Harris Administration is providing up to \$1.5 billion to states and school districts to help school meal program operators deal with the challenges of supply chain disruptions brought on by the pandemic. As the administration continues to work towards Building a Better America by investing in our communities, the funding announced today will help to provide our nation's children with the nutritious foods they need to thrive.

Some of the funded programs creates demand for locally grown produce such as Agricultural Marketing Service Local Food for Schools Cooperative Agreement Program. Under this program, the USDA will award up to \$200 million to states for food assistance purchases of domestic local foods for distribution to schools.
