This is Adam Williams, Project Manager for the Hawaii Department of Agriculture's ("HDOA") Pesticide Disposal Program ("PDP"). Starting Tuesday, July 25, 2023, from 9am – 10am, the HDOA will be holding a series of zoom meetings to discuss the HDOA's PDP.

The PDP will provide an available, affordable, and environmentally accessible mechanism by which any agricultural entity, licensed pest control operator, landscape professional, pesticide dealer, and other commercial users of pesticides in the State can, for free, dispose of up to 250 lbs of canceled, suspended, unwanted, and unlabeled ("CSUU") pesticides. <u>No enforcement action will be taken</u> against participants for disposing of CSUU pesticides.

The goal of the PDP is to promote a cleaner and safer Hawaii by reducing the amount of pesticides which could potentially impact human health or the environment.

We will be discussing:

- Acceptable and unacceptable materials;
- Who's eligible to participate;
- Getting registered;
- The event date and time; and,
- Frequently asked questions.

Maui County Farm Service Agency is Accepting Emergency Conservation Program Applications

Kahului, Hawaii, August 25, 2023 – U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) Executive Director James Robello today announced that Maui County is accepting applications for the Emergency Conservation Program (ECP) to address damages from wildfires and high winds. ECP signup is open now and will end on October 17, 2023.

The approved ECP practices under this authorization include debris removal to address wildfire and high winds damage to eligible farmland, livestock fences and conservation structures and installations. ECP assists producers with the recovery cost to restore the farmland to pre-disaster conditions. Approved ECP applicants may receive up to 75 percent of the cost of approved restoration activity. Limited resource, socially disadvantaged and beginning farmers and ranchers may receive up to 90 percent cost-share.

Heavenly Hawaiian has made arrangements to fly the coffee from the Big Island to the local smaller Kapalua airport. The local church, Maria Lanakila Catholic Church, that is still standing, has agreed to be the Lahaina collection point of coffee for direct distribution, to the Lahaina service providers.

Thanks to each of you for making your own cash and necessity goods contributions individually. Anything and everything is needed to help the survivors. Let's do our part as the HCA to help out the recovery workers with our coffee.

Farm and Agriculture Disaster Assistance

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) can provide disaster recovery assistance to farmers, ranchers, and communities affected by the wildfires.

The Farm Service Agency (FSA) offers numerous disaster assistance programs to cover crop and livestock losses, address farmland damage, and cover production and physical losses. News Release from Dept. of Ag on Emergency Loan Program

The Hawai'i Board of Agriculture (Board) yesterday voted to activate an emergency agricultural loan program to assist Maui and Hawai'i Island farmers and ranchers suffering damage from the high winds and wildfires this week. The Hawai'i Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Loan Program submitted the request to the Board and will administer the program effective immediately. The Emergency Proclamation issued by then-Acting Gov. Sylvia Luke on Aug. 8, 2023 allows the Board to activate the emergency program. The emergency loan parameters are as follows:

- Maximum loan amount: \$350,000
- Interest rate: 3 percent

- Terms of the loans are to be determined on a case-by-case basis. Consideration will be based on historical farm performance and projected cash flow based on reasonable assumption of review and expenses.
- Requirement for credit denials waived
- Three-year residency requirement waived
- Collateral requirements may be modified or waived on a case-by-case basis.
- Emergency loan applications may be submitted until February 29, 2024.
